### Alt Ward Introduction

- Alt Ward is a seventeen bed mixed acute ward at Clock View Hospital. It is one of eight acute wards within Mersey Care NHS Foundation Trust' Local Division.
- The ward is designed to have six females and eleven males although this can be fluid dependent on the ratio of bed requests
- As a mixed sex ward, Alt was chosen to be the pilot ward for the sexual safety project within local division

## Leaflet

### Reporting an Incident

- Inform staff if you witness any incidents of a sexually inappropriate nature
- Staff are available to support you if experiences or witness anything that makes you feel uncomfortable
- There is a reporting system in place that allows you to record incidents. We hand cards out twice a month but you can request one if needed

### Tips on Staying Safe and looking after yourself

- · Treat everyone with respect and dignity
- Acknowledge cultural differences
- · Ask questions about sexual safety
- Be aware of your own feelings and behaviour
- · Respect yourself and others
- We encourage a cultural of being open and honest so please speak up

### Impact

- Behaviour can be embarrassing, distressing and dangerous.
- Trigger strong feelings of fear, anxiety and trauma
- Sexually inappropriate behaviour can make people feel unsafe, uncomfortable and impacts on recovery

### Your rights to being Sexual Safe

- We are happy to support your wishes around gender specific words
- There are expected standards of behaviour to ensure that all keep others safe
- There is always support available if needed

### What is a Sexual Safety Safe Environment?

- All Word is a sale environment because we have gender specific areas; for example female only lounges, single sex bedrooms with ensuite
- Alt word have regular community meetings where sexual safety is discussed.
- Alt Ward has a sexual safety hourd and we actively encourage reporting of incidents.
   Alt Ward has an anonymous reporting system for both staff and service user to take any concerns around sexual safety.

### What are the Consequence's?

- . Enduring harm
- Damages self-esteem and other relationships
- . Damage trust between individuals
- Possible sexual transmitted infections and pregnancy
- The emotional and psychological impact can be significant

### Sexually disinhibited behaviour.

- Inability to restrain from sexual impulses and involves inappropriate sexualised language
- Increased sexual thoughts, removing clothing and indiscriminate sexual activity

### How do you look after your own Sexual Safety?

- Take responsibility for yourself
- Keep personal information safe
- Speak up; report any incidents or concerns




## Divisional Changes

 Sexual Safety is now an agenda item on the local division safety huddle; the safety huddle is a weekly forum provides a continual and clear line of sight of the quality of the care provided (from ward to board) with the aim of reviewing and triangulating information on a weekly basis, highlighting areas of potential risk early, implementing supportive action to enhance safety and quality and prevent/reduce untoward events occurring. It will also identify learning themes and trends to support effective risk management.

## Changes to DATIX Coding

- Sexual Safety Recording on DATIX
- Sexual incidents has been added to the incident coding section to the DATIX for all 14 wards across the division
- Categories include; sexual assault patient on patient, patient on staff or other, staff or other on patient, report sexual abuse prior to MCT care and sexually inappropriate behaviour
- Sub categories have been divided into A-D dependent on the severity of the incident; serious sexual assault (A), safeguarding threat of sexual abuse, report of sexual abuse and alleged serious sexual assault (B), alleged sexual assault (C) and sexually disinhibited behaviour (D).



# Staff guidance in categorising DATIX

Incident Type	Slight (D)	Minor (D)	Moderate (C)	Major (B)	Catastrophic (A)
Sexual Safety When considering the impact of a sexual safety incident weight should be given to the vulnerability of the victim and impact on them. Bare in mind that different individuals As a result of this approach the same type of incident may be scored differently depending on the vulnerability and impact on the individual	Sexual safety incidents where the victim was not greatly distressed or significantly vulnerable. These could include unintentional nakedness or verbal abuse	Sexual safety incidents where the victim was distressed and or was vulnerable These could include failure to respect sexual boundaries, such as demeaning or inappropriate comments or questions. Consider the capacity of both parties and the level of distress caused	Sexual safety incidents were the victim was distressed and or was vulnerable. This could include sexual harassment or assault. The vulnerability of the victim and the level of distress caused are critical to how high this is graded where this	Sexual safety incident causing great distress and or the abuse of a vulnerable person. These could include sexual assault.	Allegation of rape incident involves apolice investigation

## The Impact

- In the three months prior to the start of the sexual safety project there were 15 recorded sexual safety incidents.
- In the last three months of this year there have been 54, showing a significant increase since the change in coding
- We predicted an increase before the change was implemented therefore the executives were made aware of this

## Challenges

- Long pause in the project (7 x months)
- Change of ward function
- Sickness/pandemic
- Staff turnover/role changes
- Measuring the impact

## Where are we up to

Collaborative ends September 2021

 Change of focus from the story of the project rather than measurement and data
