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#### Notes from the editor

It is a great honour to introduce myself as the new editor of the Transcultural Psychiatry Special Interest Group Newsletter. I am very excited for taking this role, and contribute to the great effort our Chair and executive committee have made to expand the reach of our group. Even though I joined the TSIG in a time of great uncertainty and change for almost everyone, led by Dr Shahid Latif, the TSIG has not only kept very active organising events focused on transcultural psychiatry, but it has also helped develop resources for people during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Although many guidelines and programmes have been develop to help people maintain a positive mental health, most of them do not consider individual elements, such as ethnicity, gender, sex, or age. If we also take in consideration the evidence showing the disproportionate negative outcomes for people from BAME backgrounds, then we can argue it is important to consider people's culture when developing wellbeing interventions.

To help address this issue, the TSIG group has not only to raise awareness about the disproportionate death rates in people and staff from BAME backgrounds, but it also developed material to support people's mental health during the pandemic. For example, the TSIG created a series of videos, in more than 15 languages, focused on providing advice on how to maintain a

positive mental health; and for World Mental Health Day, the group also created a video to increase awareness about the importance of understanding mental health in different cultures.

In this newsletter you will learn more about all the activities the TSIG and its members have engaged with over the last year, including events focused on transcultural psychiatry and promoting diversity, as well as work conducted abroad and about the initiatives taken by the TSIG to support people during the pandemic. I hope you find this edition not only interesting, but also inspiring, as we would like to encourage you to contribute for our following issues. We, as the TSIG, would like to include, and provide a platform to anyone interested in transcultural psychiatry and any other cultural aspect that you consider could influence people's lives and mental health.

## First International Psychiatry and Addiction Masterclass, 13<sup>th</sup>-14<sup>th</sup> November 2020

The RCPsych TSIG was invited to participate in the First International Psychiatry and Addiction Masterclass Chaired by Dr Yasir Abbasi (TSIG executive member) that took place on the 13<sup>th</sup>-14<sup>th</sup> November 2020. Dr Latif presented 'Interpretation of mental Health Symptoms in Different Cultures' and Dr Hasanen Al-Taier presented 'Cultural aspects of Forensic Psychiatry'.





#### Work abroad and other events

#### **Tibet**

In November 2019 Dr Hasanen Al Taiar joined the CEO of the Tibet Relief Fund (TRF) Ms Philippa Carrick in Dharamsala in north India to look at child mental health problems in Tibetan refugee children in camps and settlements. We visited the Tibetan Ability Center (TAC) which is a non-profit organisation based in Dharamsala. We also visited Delek Hospital where we met the Chief Medical Officer who advised that the medical field's main problem is retention of newly qualified doctors.

Recommendations:

- Improving the healthcare provision via equipment, resources and staffing.
- Training doctors and other allied health professionals.

 Building professional capacity in people dealing with special needs.



#### Iraq

Dr Hasanen Al-Taiar delivered a number of training sessions on mental health, Covid and Stigma this year. He delivered a lecture at Wasit University medical School in Iraq that addressed an audience of 250 professionals via zoom in May 2020. He also worked with psychiatric colleagues in Iraq and the UK to organise and deliver a number of training events around the impact of Covid-19 on our mental wellbeing.

#### African community in the UK

He delivered a joint presentation with Dr Leena Reddy (consultant psychiatrist) on 18th July 2020 addressing the African community in the UK. The aim of the presentation was to improve public awareness about Covid19 given the misconceptions and to fight stigma around this illness and mental illness in general.



## India: Increasing awareness of medical training initiative (MTI) scheme in Asia

The 72nd Annual National Conference of Indian Psychiatric Society (ANCIPS 2020) was held in Kolkata, India during 21-25 January 2020. British Indian Psychiatric Association (BIPA) in collaboration with Royal College of Psychiatrists and Indian Psychiatric Society (IPS) organised a symposium on "Developing International career Psychiatry: in Opportunities in U.K." The symposium was delivered Dr Santosh by Mudholkar, President, British Indian **Psychiatric** Association (BIPA), Dr Kate Lovett, Dean, RCPsych and Dr Subodh Dave, Associate Dean, Trainee Support, RCPsych.

The symposium offered unique opportunity for trainees and tutors from all over India to interact with senior Consultant Psychiatrists practising in U.K. The three presentations gave an overview RCPsych Medical Training Initiative (MTI) scheme and highlighting role of RCPsych, psychiatry training in U.K, membership exams, NHS and bodies. regulatory In addition, the presentations also highlighted cultural issues in doctor: patient relationship and psychiatric practice. The symposium was immensely popular with the young trainees who had packed auditorium for a 09:00 am start. The

interactive nature of the symposium and lots of time for Q&As provided a food for thought for young trainees regarding career planning.

#### **Culture, thoughts and words**

#### **Transcultural Psychiatry and Covid-19**

As the pandemic continues to globally evolve, we are gaining knowledge on the ways that pre-existing health inequities exacerbate the risks and vulnerabilities of individuals to suffering from the virus. In the United Kingdom, the impact the BAME on communities has been particularly significant. There are also forewarnings of a mental health crisis in light of the traumatic experiences of individuals recovering from Covid-19 and the experience of public health measures such as a 'lockdown'. Given this, we need to ensure that we develop a solid platform from where we can perceive and adequately respond to the transcultural navigations of the nature of traumas related to the pandemic; this is going to require skills to interpret and understand localised explanatory models of distress, and impacts of racism or persecution, for example, on belief-systems, help-seeking behaviour, and coping strategies. A transcultural lens is required for analysing the psychiatric dimension of the pandemic.

## I love my Community: Culture, stigma and mental health project

I have always been concerned about stigma associated with mental illness in all cultures and people's suffering in silence. I had an opportunity to make my community understand that mental illness is an illness like other body illnesses by supervising a team of five children: Aden (lead 1), Zenia (lead 2), Sidhart, Rania & Mism; called 'Five Alive' for Humberside Lifestyle Awards 2018.

- Five Alive worked on their project 'Promoting Mental Health Awareness in the Community', which focused on targeting the culturally defined stigma associated with mental health.
- They conveyed the message: "It's OK not to be OK", & "it's not OK to sweep things under the carpet and be scared to speak about mental illness".
- We prepared demonstrations on mental health illnesses like depression, anxiety, selfharm and psychosis, etc. to spread the message in the community.
- We visited nursing homes where children did demonstrations for nursing staff on how to identify dementia symptoms in the elderly, and the appropriate next steps. i.e. when to involve GP or HTT to keep patients safe.



- Team visited market place, GP Surgeries,
   Take Away and super stores to distribute
   leaflets about mental health.
- We put stalls of homemade snacks to collect money for the charity 'When you wish upon a star'. We raised 450£.
- We received support from Mayor of Grimsby Hazel Chase, who visited our stall in Grimsby Summer Fair.
- Team was awarded with Category one prize of Wales Holidays, by the Humberside Police.
