Dear member

Scotland has three medical Royal Colleges – the oldest, the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh, was formed in 1505 and was in 1870 the stage for a pivotal moment in the fight for women to train as doctors. Our home in Scotland is a small number of rooms at the Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh, if you are lucky enough to attend the International Congress in June, the RCPsychScot staff would be delighted to welcome you to the member's lounge there. If you go onto any of the Scottish College websites they will proudly proclaim they are international in focus. By necessity, for them to thrive from a small country they have to look to a wider network of support from doctors around the world. They offer a rich variety of international training and range of qualifications and grades of membership. And that is my vision for RCPsych.

But why should the College bother? The size of the College in England alone is sufficient to maintain its core activities. Yet international expansion and engagement is so much more than simply creating economies of scale. I am looking forward to the Chairs of the International Divisions joining College Council – no longer a "UK" Council but one with an international identity.



I am a Spanish national and a medical graduate of the University of Santiago de Compostela. I completed my subsequent basic and higher specialist training in psychiatry in Ireland. Therefore, I have a strong understanding of the international dynamics at play in medical/psychiatric collegiate relationships.

I am a Consultant in General Adult Psychiatry and Intellectual Disability Psychiatry, Clinical Senior Lecturer Trinity College Dublin, and Honorary Senior Lecturer Royal College of Surgeons Ireland. I continue my strong involvement in research and medical education, both as a tutor and medical student examiner. I hold a Medical Doctorate by Trinity College Dublin and I am a Fellow of the Royal College of Psychiatrists. I have been a member of the editorial board of high impact scientific journals including BJPsych Advances and Journal of the Royal College of Psychiatrists.

In terms of my European International Division role, I took the lead in the organisation of the first conference of the Division in several years which was held in Dublin in March 2018, and a successful and well attended event. The line-up included well-recognised national and international speakers, including Prof. Norman Sartorius.

It is vitally important that professional psychiatric international engagement and collaboration are fostered. Working together with mutual respect and synergy makes us all stronger and better than the sum of the individual parts. The Covid-19 pandemic has been a true and dreadful impediment to international professional, intellectual exchange and direct interpersonal interaction, as well as a huge medical challenge, that has been somewhat overcome through public health measures and professional interactive communication strategy innovation.

Featured International Project

Ghana subspecialty training project

The College is working in partnership with the Ghana College of Physicians and Surgeons (GCPS) to deliver subspecialty training to psychiatry trainees in the region. We were pleased to successfully secure a grant from the Tropical Health & Education Trust (THET) last year to support this volunteer project.

The faculties of Addiction, CAHMS, Forensic and Old Age psychiatry provided highly skilled volunteers who are creating training modules in these subspecialities, while working closely with colleagues at the GCPS. As part of the project, 50 trainees in Ghana will be registered as RCPsych Pre-Membership Psychiatric Trainees for a year and enjoy the many benefits this membership includes. The training modules will be delivered as live webinars, but the recordings will also be available.

Subspeciality training has been identified as a key area of development desired by trainees in the region, and in many other regions globally. The College are pleased to be part of this collaboration and we look forward to updating you on the delivery of the training in the coming months.

RCPsych Certified Courses

This month we have launched bookings for the first of our new RCPsych Certificated Courses. These courses are on specific topics in psychiatry and other aspects of mental health and well-being. Each 45-hour course will be open to psychiatrists from all specialties, other doctors and a range of multi-disciplinary professionals. On successful completion of the course, candidates will be awarded the Royal College of Psychiatrists' Certificate on the topic.

A combination of eLearning and taught learning, these courses are tailored to the needs of individual practitioners and their employing organisations across the world. The courses are aimed at upskilling the mental health workforce and addressing some of the gaps between evidence and practice in current service provision.

The first of these courses will be in Autism, Developmental Disorders and the Criminal Justice System.

Advances in Psychiatry Across Ages (APAA), Dubai

The Advances in Psychiatry Across Ages (APAA) conference took place in Dubai, UAE, on 14-15 January 2022. The event was organised by the American Center for Psychiatry and Neurology, a medical faculty which provides medical and health education services. There were two full days of seminars delivered by esteemed psychiatrists, with topics ranging from managing severe and complex psychosis, to the evolution of Integrated Psychiatry in UAE.

The College was represented by Dr Mani Santhanakrishnan, RCPsych Old Age Faculty Chair, Prof Mohammed Al-Uzri, Presidential Lead for International Affairs and Agnes Raboczki, International Liaison Manager. Dr Santhanakrishnan spoke on raising awareness of delirium within healthcare and Prof Al-Uzri spoke on psychiatric services and the pandemic and how that will effect the future of psychiatry. Ms Raboczki spoke on the College and its many resources that are available to members overseas and early career psychiatrists in preparation for their MRCPsych.

There was a good attendance from Gulf trainees and the RCPsych team received many questions around specialty training and subspecialty exposure, with many trainees planning to take the exam and hoping to gain experience in the NHS.

Al Amal Psychiatric Hospital visit, Dubai

Professor Mohammed Al-Uzri had the opportunity to visit Maudsley Health (MH) in Dubai, United Arab Emirates (UAE). Since 2018 Maudsley Health has been supporting the development and managing service delivery at Al Amal Psychiatric Hospital. The hospital is a federal government mental health facility run under the aegis of Emirates Health Services Establishment (EHSE), UAE.

He met with Dr Yasir Abbasi (Head of Addiction at MH), Dr Mohamed Maksoud (Clinical Director at MH) and Jo Fletcher (Managing Director at MH) and discussed potential opportunities for collaboration. Al Amal Psychiatric Hospital is a tertiary care mental health hospital which caters for patients from Dubai and the Northern Emirates. It is a 190 bedded hospital which provides both outpatient and inpatient care and has led the way in innovatively delivering mental health care in the middle east region.

Al Amal Psychiatric Hospital delivers a high standard of quality general adult care and has specialised clinic academic groups (CAGs) for Addiction, Child and Adolescent Mental Health (CAMHS), Forensic, Intellectual Disability and Older Adults. The hospital led the way in delivering mental health care during the COVID 19 pandemic and introduced e-clinics and strict measures and controls to contain the pandemic successfully, whilst simultaneously supporting the wellbeing of staff under the guidance of the UAE government.

This collaboration between Al Amal Hospital and Maudsley Health has led to a number of international accreditations and recognition for the hospital, including Joint Commission International Accreditation (JCIA) in 2019, ISO 45001 in 2021 and ISO 45003 in 2021 (being the world's first hospital to achieve this).

They discussed collaboration with the Royal College of Psychiatrist around research and training with possible further discussions about the <u>Medical Training Initiative (MTI)</u> in the United Kingdom.
